



Water Trail Access Points- Status














Franklin Township Area March 2023



WOODHILL CEMETERY



Woodhill Cemetery is believed to have originated in the 1850's, being taken over by Franklin Township in approximately 1882




DICK'S CREEK CEMETERY

- No current or future projects proposed




Dick's Creek Cemetery is one of the oldest cemeteries in Warren County. **Established in 1810**, it is the final resting place of several Revolutionary War and Civil War soldiers. The last known burial was in the 1920's according to the Warren County Genealogical Society website.





The vision should include:

- The common values of a community.
- The qualities or resources that make Franklin Township unique or describe its identity.
- The attributes people like and want to be sure to keep.
- The preferred future for subject areas such as land use, natural environment, parks, infrastructure, agriculture and quality of life.
- Transition issues between uses (i.e. landscape buffers, architectural mitigation, traffic management).





WHAT IS A COMMUNITY VISION?

A community vision is an image of a community's future that describes values and aspirations over the next 10 to 20 years. The statement should address all aspects that make up a community, such as social, cultural and economic fabric. The community vision helps define the direction a plan will go.

MISSION

Franklin Township affords an unusually good quality of life—a wide range of services, opportunities, amenities, and quality infrastructure (desirable school districts, safe roads, efficient fire service, cherished parks, and quality cemeteries). The Hunter commercial district, access to the Great Miami River Trail, and neighborhoods are enhanced. The Township has acted to maintain its boundaries; to accommodate appropriate and balanced growth; and collaborates with other jurisdictions and the County in dealing with common concerns. As a result, the township's evolution has successfully maintained and woven the small town feel of established neighborhoods with new development.

Franklin Township, Warren County, is defined by its friendly community, quality parks, and the Hunter commercial corridor. Township residents enjoy the beauty and amenities of the Great Miami River and Twin Creek, ample recreational opportunities, excellent education for students, and being part of an active, growing community. The Township continues to prioritize the preservation of township boundaries, access to essential public services, and opportunities for future development.

Franklin Township is treasured for its friendly and welcoming atmosphere, well maintained roads, and quiet residential neighborhoods. Residents enjoy excellent fire and emergency response times; well-maintained and dependable public facilities; beautiful parks; effective stormwater management; enhanced central sewer service; access to excellent school districts and safe roads and thus a high quality of life within Franklin Township.

Franklin Township has acted to develop a diverse and compatible mix of commercial, industrial, and residential land uses and thus, has a strong and sustainable tax base. The Township, widely recognized for its positive business climate, is the home to many small and locally owned businesses and services that offer employment and provides civic benefits. Neighborhoods and parks contribute to a high quality of life by providing a full array of recreation opportunities (active recreation, walking and viewing wildlife). The Township has invested strategically and leveraged grant funds to ensure a safe, well-maintained public services and facilities (schools, parks, roads, fire service).


